Some maths facts and vocabulary can be tricky to remember. Here are some examples of simple maths themed rhymes:

0,2,4,6,8 even numbers they are great. 1,3,5,7,9 we love odd numbers all the time.

For rounding ... zero to four down to the floor, five to nine climb the vine.



Make Your Own Crazy Song

Struggling to remember a maths fact? Make up a silly poem or song about it!

- Some people find music and rhythm really helps them to remember. Add some actions to go with the words, being a bit silly can help too!
- You could ask an adult to help. Why not get them to sing it to you? That really will be something to remember!
- Here’s an example for learning about converting between metres, centimetres and millimetres.

The Length Poem

Peter Millimetre is a tiny grain of sand, $\times 10$
Rita Centimetre is the width of a finger on your hand, $\times 100$
Dita the Metre is the width of a doorway in your home, $\times 1000$
Cheetah Kilometre is going on a long roam, $\times 1000$
10 times, 100 times, 1000 times bigger!

Think of an area of maths or some maths vocabulary you sometimes find tricky to remember and create a rhyme, poem or rap to help you. First, you will need to brainstorm the facts and vocabulary you need to remember and then it’s time to be creative.
